



BUK Hosts 49th Annual Soil Science Conference: Minister of Agriculture Proposes Strategic Partnership to Enhance Nigeria's Food Security

The Federal Government has assured commitment to revitalize the agricultural sector using science and strategic partnership, the minister of State for Agriculture and Food Security, Dr. Senator Aliyu Sabi Abdullahi, has declared.

Declaring the 49th Annual Conference of the Soil Science Society of Nigeria (SSSN) on Tuesday, 7th April, 2025, the minister emphasized that soil health was not just a scientific concern but a national imperative—central to food security, economic stability and sustainable development.

The conference was themed “Promoting Soil Health and Resilience Through Research and Innovation for Sustainable Development.” The five-day gathering, which was co-hosted by the Bayero University's Faculty of Agriculture and the Centre for Dryland Agriculture (CDA), was held at the Conference hall of the CBN Centre of Excellence building in the new campus.

The minister warned that Nigeria's soils were under

significant stress due to erosion, deforestation, unsustainable land practices and climate-related challenges, all of which threatened the country's ability to feed its growing population.

Dr Sabi Aliyu, however, disclosed that President Bola Ahmed Tinubu's Renewed Hope Agenda has the potentiality of bailing the country out of the quagmire, as he outlined government's initiatives and pledged strong institutional support for sustainable soil management.

The minister announced the establishment of the National Farmers Soil Health Scheme — a transformative initiative aimed at enhancing soil fertility and farm productivity nationwide. He said the ministry would work in partnership with Bayero University, through the CDA and Faculty of Agriculture, describing the university as a strategic partner in driving the scheme's rollout.

“We see immense value in leveraging BUK's expertise to empower farmers and protect Nigeria's most valuable natural asset — its soil,” the Minister affirmed.

Earlier, in his address, the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas, welcomed participants to what he described as a gathering of minds committed to reshaping the future of agriculture in Nigeria.

The Vice Chancellor who was represented by the Deputy Vice Chancellor Academic, Professor Haruna Musa, said the theme of the conference was timely, addressing urgent global concerns about soil degradation, food insecurity and the impacts of climate change on agricultural systems.

In his welcome address, the President of the Soil Science Society of Nigeria, Professor Jibrin Mohammed Jibrin, echoed similar sentiments, describing it as a “gathering of visionaries.” He praised the role of research and innovation in restoring soil health and appreciated the government's growing support.

He also acknowledged contributions from key industry partners like OCPAfrica, Soil Values and Exchange Africa, noting their role in bridging research and real-world agricultural practice. Professor Jibrin, who is also the Director, Centre for Dryland Agriculture, further highlighted the SSSN's commitment to nurturing the next generation of scientists through initiatives like the Soil Talk Lecture Series and its continued sponsorship of young soil researchers at national conferences.

“We are building not just knowledge, but a legacy,” he remarked, also in his speech, the President of the Nigeria Institute of Soil Science (NISS), Professor A.M. Kundiri, reinforced the urgency of prioritizing soil health, which he described as vital to agricultural productivity, environmental resilience and national well-being. Maternal and Infant Nutrition Intervention Remain a Major Strategic Investment in Nation's Future – Prof. Galadanci

Intervention in maternal, infant and young child nutrition is capable of reducing long-term healthcare costs and accelerates human capital development, making it not just a humanitarian imperative but also a strategic investment in the nation's future, the Director of the Africa Center of Excellence for Population Health and Policy (ACEPHAP), Professor Hadiza Galadanci, has said.

Speaking during a supervision visit to the MIYCN site at Rimi Village of Sumaila Local Government of Kano state on Thursday, 3rd April, 2025 to assess the impact of the Maternal, Infant and Young Child Nutrition (MIYCN) Project, Prof. Galadanci stated that nutrition interventions often yielded broad and lasting benefits, including improved maternal and child health outcomes, reduced mortality rates, enhanced cognitive and physical development and increased economic productivity.

According to her, individuals who were well-nourished were more likely to excel academically, engage productively in the workforce and contribute meaningfully to national progress. She urged the beneficiaries to share their newly acquired knowledge with other women in their communities to expand the ripple effect of the intervention.

training across Nigeria's agricultural landscape.

The Chairman of the National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA), General Mohammed Buba Marwa (rtd), represented by the Kano State Commandant, Abubakar Idris Ahmad, linked soil to a lesser-known but important issue — illicit drug cultivation.

He revealed the NDLEA's efforts to combat illegal *cannabis* plantations, warning that poor land management can sometimes open doors to criminal activity in rural areas.

Earlier, the Dean of the Faculty of Agriculture, Professor Muhammad Auwal Hussain, welcomed delegates and traced the Faculty's journey from 2001 with just three departments to its current robust structure comprising eight departments and five undergraduate programmes.

He described the conference as a crucial platform for networking, sharing innovative ideas and shaping the direction of agricultural research and development.

Highlight of the event was conferment of the Fellow Awards to three distinguished personalities, who were the minister of state for Agriculture, Senator Dr. Sabi Aliyu Abdullahi, the Governor of Borno State, Professor Bababgana Umara Zulum and Professor Adam Lawan Ngala, in recognition of their distinguished contributions to the field of agriculture and soil science,

The conference also featured two lead paper presentations delivered by Professor B.D. Tarfa, the Vice-Chancellor of the Federal University of Agriculture, Mubi, and one other by Dr. Martin Yemefack, the former President of the African Soil Science Society (ASSS), Cameroon.

It could be recalled that ACEPHAP in January, last year, collaborated with Lighthouse Humanitarian Foundation (LHF) and launched a bold and strategic initiative, the

Malnutrition, particularly among women and children, remains a deeply rooted challenge in the state. Its consequences are profound, manifesting in high rates of maternal mortality, childhood stunting, impaired cognitive development and a weakened immune system that increases susceptibility to illness. These issues diminish an individual's potential and restrict full participation in community life, ultimately hindering the region's social and economic development.

The project featured a wide range of activities in which 150 women with their children benefitted. This includes intensive workshops that educated participants on healthy dietary practices during pregnancy, the prevention and management of nutrition-related health conditions and the importance of adhering to Iron-Folic Acid (IFAS) and Multiple Micronutrient Supplementation (MMS).

Beneficiaries were also trained on breastfeeding techniques, appropriate complementary feeding, personal and food hygiene and practical food preparation. Demonstrations on how to prepare soybean-based milk and sessions on home gardening and small-scale livestock rearing added valuable life skills that could be immediately applied in their homes. To support these efforts, livestock such as goats and chickens were distributed to the beneficiaries along with soybean for producing nutritious milk to feed themselves and their children.

The Stakeholders expressed deep satisfaction and appreciation for the intervention, describing it as timely, relevant and empowering. Community leaders pledged their solid support for the sustainability of the initiative. One local elder shared his admiration, noting that the

project had gone beyond relief by building capacity and encouraging independence among women.

The Beneficiaries themselves spoke glowingly of the transformation they experienced. Zainab, a young mother from the ward, explained how the project changed her approach to pregnancy and childcare, saying she now understood the importance of supplements and shared that knowledge with others. Another participant, Maryam, expressed how learning to make soybean milk and care for livestock helped her to provide better nutrition for her children, boosting her confidence and sense of purpose.

Also speaking during the site visit, Barrister Kareemah Imam, the Country Director of Lighthouse Humanitarian Foundation (LHF), expressed her profound commitment to sustaining and expanding such impactful initiatives. She stated that LHF remained dedicated to empowering communities and improving societal well-being through evidence-based community-driven projects, noting that the success of the MIYCN Project in Rimi Ward served as a model for similar programs across the state and beyond.

The visit was graced by several distinguished dignitaries, whose presence accentuated the importance of the project and the unified commitment to its objectives. Among those in attendance were Professor Salisu Maiwada Abubakar, President of the Nutrition Society of Nigeria (NSN) and the ACEPHAP Deputy Director, Outreach, Professor Baba Musa Maiyaki, Monitoring and Evaluation Officer, Professor Taiwo Amole, Deputy Director, Research, Professor Aisha Gadanya, Dr. Fatima Muhammad and Alhaji Sunusi, a member of the Board of Trustees of LHF.

Lassa Fever:

1. Lassa Fever is a viral illness spread by a rat found in parts of West Africa
2. People can get Lassa Fever by having contact with infected rats or their saliva, urine, or droppings
3. Lassa fever can spread between people
4. Mild symptoms include: (a) Fever (high temperature) and shivering (b) Feeling tired and weak (c) Generalised pain (d) Sore throat

Prevention:

- (1) Put food away in rat-proof containers and keep the home clean.
- (2) Avoid eating these rats.
- (3) Trap rats in and around homes.
- (4) Health care providers caring for patients with Lassa fever, should take precautions like: Wearing protective clothing (masks, gloves, gowns, and goggles), Properly sterilizing equipment; Taking infection control measures Isolating infected patients until they are cured
